

Tokyo Festival Farm 2022 Farm-Lab Exhibition Open Call: Performers for a New Production Directed by Tokyo-based y/n on the Theme of Education [Deadline: Monday, June 27, 2022 5pm (JST)]

Farm-Lab Exhibition is a trial creation program that brings together emerging artists based in Asia to work with other participants from various cultures, nationalities and backgrounds. This year, two different teams will join a residency program held in Tokyo.

- A performing arts piece directed by Serena MAGILIW (Directed by an artist based in Asia, outside Japan / Open Call for performers based in Japan)
- A performing arts piece directed by y/n (Directed by an artist based in Japan / Open Call for performers based in Asia, excluding Japan)

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About the production

Theme: "Education"

We will be creating a new performance arts piece based on the theme of "education." As y/n, we have always presented our work in a lecture performance format and held Q&A sessions between y/n and the audience after each presentation. The lecture (performance) and Q&A formats are, of course, strongly associated with education, and in that sense one could say that y/n has always pondered on the topic of education. However, that does not mean that these lectures (performances) and Q&A sessions intend to unilaterally deliver a "correct answer" to the audience. Rather, we, ourselves and our works have constantly evolved through our interactions with the audience. There is a side of information delivery to education, but by itself that undoubtedly leads to a kind of contracted reproduction. So what actually is going on, if not that? A great performance should also bring about more than just the delivery of information (more than simply conveying an anti-war or anti-discrimination message, for example). For y/n, at least, thinking about education and thinking about performance are directly related. We do not necessarily intend to impose the lecture performance format on this new piece, but together with the performers, we will continue to explore how, and what kind of, relationships can be established with the audience.

Although y/n will be taking on the composition and direction (Hashimoto also plans to be in the performance), the material and ideas for the piece will be based on discussions between the performers and y/n. We will discuss the education that each of us has experienced, its underlying social systems and customs, and our ideas surrounding these topics. Our hope is that the discussions we have together with participants from various different backgrounds will bring about new perspectives on education. Throughout the creation process and performance, we aim to create a space where y/n and the performers, the artists and the audience alike, may stimulate each other and evolve!

■ About the creation

Within y/n's creation process, we encourage participants to bring their own experiences, stories, and ideas related to the theme. We will edit and compose a text on that basis (and at times fictionalize the material) to create a script for the performance.

■ Director's biography

y/n (HASHIMOTO Kiyoshi + YAMAZAKI Kenta)

Founded in 2019 by HASHIMOTO Kiyoshi (Director, Actor) and YAMAZAKI Kenta (Critic, Dramaturg). y/n makes performances that consider personal matters within the context of social structures through their research and documentary-based method. The unit name comes from the question yes/no, referring to binary opposition, contradiction, the state before reaching the answer. Previous works include *Coming Out Lessons* (2020), which deals with coming out as gay; *Sex/Work/Art* (2021), which deals with the work of sex workers and actors; and *On Not Being Fooled Like You* (2021), which deals with the history of magic tricks in Japan.

Born in 1988, he is a director and an actor. He graduated from Nihon University College of Art, Department of Theater, Directing Course, and in 2007 he launched Bruno Produce. He was a Saka-Agari Scholarship recipient from 2012 to 2015. His recent productions include Seinendan Link Cui Disturbing the Landscape (2019) and Seinendan Youth Group Independent Sakurauchi Project's The Little Match Girl (2020). Farm-Lab Exhibition Program Overview "To places you cannot reach alone"

Farm-Lab Exhibition, part of Tokyo Festival Farm, is a trial creation program in which emerging artists based in Asia collaborate with other members from various cultures, nationalities, and backgrounds. The product will be a work-in-progress presentation, with the ambition of ultimately showing at Tokyo Festival and elsewhere in Asia. This year will feature two teams, each with different directors: Serena MAGILIW, based in Manila, The Philippines (a past participant of Tokyo Festival Farm 2021 Asian Performing Arts Camp); and y/n, based in Japan (a unit consisting of director/actor HASHIMOTO Kiyoshi and critic/dramaturg YAMAZAKI Kenta). NAKAJIMA Nanako, a dance dramaturg who is active in both Japan and overseas, and NAGASHIMA Kaku, dramaturg and co-director of the Tokyo Festival Farm, will act as mentors to support the creation process.

Collaboration begins online in early August, and participants will come to Tokyo for a 10-day residency in late September. In early October, they will perform their work-in-progress to the public at Tokyo Metropolitan Theatre's Atelier East and Atelier West (TBD), where the artists will receive feedback from the audience to further improve themselves and their work.

■ Creation environment:

- Communication between participants will mostly be conducted in English. Interpreters will be present throughout the meetings and rehearsals to assist communication with many of the Japanese-speaking organizers and staff members.
- During the residency, we will follow a strict code of measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

To ensure a safe creative space that is non-discriminatory to individuals of all social categories, Tokyo Festival Farm Lab Will follow the "Tokyo Festival Farm Lab Guidelines" (https://tokyo-festival.jp/en/tf_farm). We expect all participants to adhere to these principles.

Open Call Overview

This is an open call to participate in a performing arts piece (a trial creation) directed by y/n. Performers, actors, dancers, etc. (Participants will be expected to perform in the piece. However, any background or title is acceptable.)

■ Eligibility

Participants must meet all seven conditions.

- 1. Must be based in Asia other than Japan.
- 2. Must be aged 35 or younger (as a general rule).
- 3. Must be able to attend all the above dates (see p.3).
- 4. Must be able to cooperate with the advertisement and PR activities conducted by Tokyo Festival for the participant's program.
- 5. Must have access to a suitable online environment that includes the following:
 - A secure internet connection.
 - A robust internet connection able to support group video calls, video streaming, large file downloads, etc.
 - A device on which the participant can use online tools such as Zoom's video calls, Slack, or One Drive (the tools used may vary according to participant circumstances and program content)
 *System requirements for Zoom: https://support.zoom.us/hc/en-us/articles/201362023
 - We do not encourage the use of smartphones as the only device for communication.

- 6. Must be able to cooperate with the necessary procedures for travel and stay in Japan. (The costs are at your own expense.)
 - Provide necessary information to obtain a certificate of eligibility in Japan(passport information, vaccination status, etc.)
 - Visa application at the Japanese Embassy, Consulate or Permanent Mission in your country.
 - PCR testing until 72 hours prior to departure to Japan
- 7. Participants are expected to demonstrate the following attitudes and interests:
 - A willingness to actively communicate in English.
 - A motivation to communicate with people of different backgrounds and values, and gain new perspectives.
 - An interest in exploring and practicing communication strategies in international collaboration settings.
 - The intention to continue international activities in the performing arts after the Farm-Lab Exhibition.
 - An interest in how performance influences audiences and how, or what kind of, relationships can be established with the audience in a performance space.

■ Fee

100,000 JPY (transfer fees, tax, and similar costs may be deducted from this amount)

■ Available Support

- Japanese-English interpreters will be available throughout online and in-person rehearsals and meetings with Japanese staff members.
 - *Please note that there will be many instances, such as Slack messages or everyday interactions outside of rehearsals, where interpretation will not be provided.
- The Communication Design Team will assist with facilitating collaboration in a multicultural and multilingual setting. They will give lectures on multicultural communication, share guidelines among participants, and provide support for any questions or concerns on the topic during the creative process.

For participants living outside of Japan, we provide:

- Accommodation during the length of the program (including the waiting period after arrival)
- Round-trip flight tickets from your airport to Haneda or Narita Airport, round-trip shuttle between the relevant Tokyo airport and accommodation

Tokyo Festival Farm 2022 Theme: Unlearning Cities

"Cities ≠ Gathering"

This year's Tokyo Festival Farm 2022 will be held under the theme "Unlearning Cities." Drawing on last year's core question, "Why Cities?," this year we aim to actively reassess our understanding of the city as a site of gathering. In recent years, the final products of Tokyo Festival Farm's international online programs have shown us that the purpose and function of the "online" are shifting—from sharing information and time to creating actions and experiences. There are increasingly more things that can be done without physically gathering. As we let go of conventional values, perhaps our understanding of the city as a site of gathering will no longer be the standard. Still, I believe cities have a function, and that is to ensure diversity. I feel the potential of cities comes from how they allow a wide spectrum of people to gather and coexist, rather than from sheer numbers.

In this year's program, we will have two teams taking on international co-creation, exploring various possibilities of collaboration with members from different fields and backgrounds.

The online art camp will be holding an open call for participants from all over Asia. For those based in Japan, some programs will be open to visitors, and there are also assistant/internship programs to engage with sites of international co-creation. We hope you also look forward to our education outreach programs aimed at students. In all of our work, we will make efforts to prevent harassment and foster a safe environment for the performing arts based on our guidelines.

The future of this decade still remains uncertain. Tokyo Festival Farm is a site for us to create the future we want to see. We invite you to come and join us.

Toward a New Space for Coexistence and Collaboration

Common sense is changing drastically. Even within the field of art, the sensibilities and ideas that were once considered the norm no longer apply. Once effective ways of doing things are not only no longer working today, but are beginning to cause harm. These approaches were likely never harmless to begin with, but what was once overlooked is now clearly destructive or hurtful toward people.

Changes in common sense began even before the pandemic. I believe that this has become more noticeable with the thorough "reconsideration" of behavioral patterns and value systems over the past two and a half years.

Over the past two and a half years, what we have experienced is not so much a process of learning, but rather an "unlearning" or uninstalling of what we had internalized without realizing. It was a time to observe, unravel, and reexamine the value contained within, or lacking in, the things we had unconsciously or uncritically been enjoying and taking part in. How can we build on that to create a form of collective creation and collaboration that is fair and brings everyone joy? How do we rediscover and reconstruct the city as a symbol of coexistence and exchange with others? (And do we need to?) This year's theme, "Unlearning Cities," reflects such ambitions.

Tokyo Festival Farm is a place where people who feel wary of conventional approaches and have hopes for a different future can come together to cultivate the soil, sow seeds, and nurture seedlings of change at a time of great shifts in society. If this sounds like something you'd like to be a part of, please join us.

<Select initiatives>

■Implementing and maintaining guidelines for Tokyo Festival Farm Lab

We have created guidelines to prevent discrimination, harassment, and other abuses of human rights, and ask all people involved in Tokyo Festival Farm to comply with them. In addition, the contents of the guidelines are reviewed annually to ensure their continuous improvement.

■ Confirming gender pronouns and respect for gender identity

To prevent misgendering*, since last year's festival we have created a field in the application form for people to enter the pronouns (or names, etc.) that they would like to use. We will continue to share knowledge and awareness throughout the festival period to ensure that each individual's pronouns are respected.

*The discriminatory act of addressing a person as something other than their self-identified gender (e.g., using personal pronouns or honorific titles that are based on assumptions of gender based on appearance).

■Art translations that respect diversity in language and communication

English is the common language for communication within the Tokyo Festival Farm, which attracts participants from many Asian countries. However, the way English is spoken varies greatly between places and cultures. The Communication Design Team respects the forms of English spoken by all, designs an environment in which both fluent and non-fluent English speakers can communicate on an equal footing, and provides interpretation and translation services that go beyond language conversion. There are also differences in communication that arise due to cultural differences and other factors. Rather than forcing people to conform to a single cultural norm (e.g., Japanese manners), the kinds of communication necessary for the occasion will be explored through the individual perspectives that participants bring to the table.

■ Providing learning opportunities

Participants will be provided with guidance, lectures, and workshops in advance of the program to help them understand the above initiatives.

About Tokyo Festival Farm

Tokyo Festival Farm is a framework for education outreach and creative talent development within Tokyo Festival. It was launched in 2021 by combining Asian Performing Arts Farm (APAF), a platform promoting exchange and growth among young artists in Asia, with Festival/Tokyo (F/T)'s Research Program and Education & Outreach Program.

This year, Tokyo Festival Farm will be holding various programs under two categories: "Lab" for supporting the growth of emerging artists through research and development, and "School" for education outreach. "Lab" aims to cultivate young professionals who are able to freely navigate the many increasingly fluid borders of our world. The initiative encourages artists to explore the interdisciplinary and interregional "transfield" through collaboration with others. "School" provides young audiences, mainly university students, with opportunities to explore and interact through stage works by attending lectures, participating in talk events, and writing reports.
