Beyond borders, beyond the body, towards a new future for Asian performing arts

Tokyo Festival Farm Asian Performing Arts Camp is a program for performing arts practitioners working in various parts of Asia. Using their own personal themes and concerns as starting points, the participants conduct research and fieldwork, hold discussions with people from different countries and cultures, and participate in lectures and workshops. Through this process, the Camp aims to help artists cultivate thoughts and ideas together, and to explore future possibilities for their own practices and fields. The 2023 edition of the Camp will adopt a "hybrid" format, combining online activities with a stay in Tokyo lasting around one week. The final day will feature a presentation session that is open to the public, where participants can share what they have gained and exchange thoughts with the audience and guests, thus fostering their own artistic growth. If you are a creative based in Asia who plays an integral role in performing arts productions, whether as director, choreographer, playwright, dramaturg, producer or other, we encourage you to apply for this program. (The Camp will be conducted in English.)

As I joined the Camp in 2020, this year will be my first time experiencing the "in-person" time in Tokyo. Over the three years of the Camp, it was always fascinating for me to see how the online space wasn't a substitute for reality. Rather, I was glimpsing through the screen the reality which each of my friends from the Camp were living. This exchange of different "heres and nows" switched my perspective rapidly, allowing me to nurture the imagination for tuning into other worlds and my own world at the same time.

Last year, as it was gradually becoming easier to travel, the online space worked as a fixed point that connected us while we moved. Now that we have learned how to share time together while being separated, I wonder what will emerge when people get together in one place. If gathering in one city is something removed from our everyday reality, then what would be the role played by performing arts like theater and dance that are put on there? This year, the combination of the online and in-person components will allow us to re-encounter each other's daily lives and realities, hopefully showing us a new way of being for international collaboration in the performing arts. So please bring your interests, passions and questions into both the digital and physical spaces of the Camp. We look forward to seeing you online in your city and in person in Tokyo, and we hope we'll be receiving many applications.

Kyoto-based actor and theatre maker. In 2011, she started her own theatre group BRDG in order to create performances based on fieldwork and interviews with people living in Kyoto. BRDG focuses on Kyoto as a multicultural city as well as exploring the act of interpreting in performance. Collaborating with Philippine Educational Theatre Association (PETA) and young people in both Japan and the Philippines, she presented a performance "Fureru~Haplos" in February, and live-streamed an online piece "HELLO" in December 2020. As an actor, she appeared in performances of Yukichi Matsumoto, marebito theatre company, shitatame and ricca ricca*festa (Okinawa) and so on. YAMAGUCHI Keiko was an Asia Fellow 2017. She was a participant in the APAF2020 Lab and took part in Asian Performing Arts Camp 2021 and 2022 as co-facilitator. In 2019, I joined Asian Performing Arts Farm (APAF) before the pandemic. During the Lab (Camp) we explored the keywords; mobility and gravity. These keywords lead us towards thinking about New Asia. The New Asia for me that time was posed as triggering question to unearth what is Old Asia and towards the Future of Asia and the key role of performing arts towards our shared future.

The current Pandemic Asia of performing arts poses yet again new questions for me; How can we develop our craft in the performing arts towards a better society? Why does it matter for us to meet online amidst slowly going back to normalcy? What is the best thing to do with our time? Who will be joining us in Tokyo? Where will this gathering lead us? When will the pandemic end?

A lot of things have changed in the performing arts after the series of lockdown and isolation due to the pandemic. ■ Program Contents

Online Activity	Online tools such as Zoom, Miro, One Drive, etc. will be used for discussions, workshops, lectures, etc. Participants will also explore the possibility of collaboration among themselves while sharing the progress of research and project they are conducting outside of the program's activity hours.
Online Sharing Session	Each participant will present their research and project in progress as an online presentation. Tokyo Festival and Tokyo Festival Farm staff and participants will be invited as audiences.
Stay in Tokyo	In addition to discussions, workshops, and lectures, the program will plan to include exchanges with Tokyo Festival staff, visits to theaters and local artists, and other fieldwork. Participants will also research and prepare for In-Tokyo Sharing Session during the stay.
In-Tokyo Sharing Session	Each participant will present the results of their research they worked on during the program in a presentation open to the public (reservations required, free admission), followed by a feedback session featuring guest feedbackers.

^{*}English will be the primary language for the program activities and communication among participants.

^{*}The time of the online activities will be adjusted based on the time difference of the participants and will be provided by the end of July. For reference; in 2022, the online activities were held from 2:00pm – 5:00pm JST.

Japanese-English interpretation may be provided for presentations, fieldwork, and communication with staff.

^{*}Members of "Art Translator Assistant," "Farm Editorial Office Assistant Writer," and "Production Coordinator Assistant" selected through open calls from within Japan will accompany the activities.

To ensure a safe creative space that is non-discriminatory to individuals of all social categories, Tokyo Festival Farm Lab will follow the "Tokyo Festival Farm Lab Guidelines" (https://tokyo-festival.jp/en/tf_farm/). We expect all participants to adhere to these principles.

Terms of Participation

■ Eligibility

Participants must meet all conditions:

- 1. Must be based in Asia.
- 2. Must have played a key role in the creative aspect of performing arts productions or projects in the past.
- 3. Must be aged 35 or younger as of Friday, July 21, 2023, when the activity began (as a general rule).
- 4. Must be able to attend the entirety of the program (refer to p.3 for the program schedule).
- 5. Must be able to cooperate with the advertisement and PR activities conducted by Tokyo Festival.
- 6. Must have access to a suitable online environment that includes the following:
 - A secure internet connection.
 - A robust internet connection able to support group video calls, video streaming, large file downloads, etc.
 - A device on which the participant can use online tools such as Zoom video calls*, Miro, Slack, or One Drive (the tools used may vary according to participant circumstances and program content).

 - We do not encourage the use of smartphones as the only device for communication.
- 7. Must be able to cooperate with the necessary procedures for travel and stay in Japan. (The costs are at your own expense.)
 - Provide necessary information to obtain a certificate of eligibility in Japan (passport information, portrait photograph, etc.)
 - Visa application at the Japanese Embassy, Consulate or Permanent Mission in your country.
- 8. Participants are expected to demonstrate the following attitudes and interests:
 - A willingness to actively communicate in English.
 - A motivation to communicate with people of different backgrounds and values, and gain new perspectives.
 - An interest in exploring and practicing communication strategies in settings of international collaboration.
 - The intention to continue international activities in the performing arts after the program.

For participants living outside of the Kanto region in Japan who are unable to attend from home, we provide:

- Accommodation for the period of stay in Tokyo (October 3 10)
- Support for round-trip transportation from your residence to Tokyo

About Tokyo Festival Farm

Tokyo Festival Farm is a framework for education outreach and creative talent development within Tokyo Festival. It was launched in 2021 by combining Asian Performing Arts Farm (APAF), a platform promoting exchange and growth among young artists in Asia, with Festival/Tokyo (F/T)'s Research Program and Education & Outreach Program.

This year, Tokyo Festival Farm will be holding various programs under two categories: "Lab" for supporting the growth of emerging artists through research and development, and "School" for education outreach. "Lab" aims to cultivate young professionals who are able to freely navigate the many increasingly fluid borders of our world. The initiative encourages artists to explore the interdisciplinary and interregional "transfield" through collaboration with others. "School" provides young audiences, mainly university students, with opportunities to explore and interact through stage works by attending lectures and participating in talk events.
